GET TO KNOW YOUR EMERGENCY MANAGER

What is the reporting structure?

• Airport Authority, Municipality, etc.

What are their priorities?

• What risks keep them up at night?

What are their needs?

- How can you help?
- Do they understand your role and responsibilities?

Get to know the terminology

• Training



Read, highlight and ask clarifying questions

Understand the difference between FAA, State and Federal Requirements. Know how the plans relate to one another and the triggers.

- Airport Emergency Plan
- Evacuation Plan
- Continuity of Operations Plan
- Family Assistance Plan
- Active Shooter
- Emergency Operations Center Plan
- Communicable Disease
- Damage Assessment
- (Risk / Threat Assessment)

FAR 139.325(b), Airport Emergency Plan

Each Certificate Holder must develop and maintain an Airport Emergency Plan designed to minimize the possibility and extent of personal injury and property damage.

Airside (Movement vs Non-Movement)


- Access Points
